Dr. Colin Bradford

The Brookings Institution, Non-resident Senior Fellow, Global Economy and Development

Dr. Colin Bradford is a Research Professor of Economics and International Relations and Distinguished Economist in Residence at American University. He holds a joint appointment between the Department of Economics and the School for International Service. Professor Bradford is the convener of a group of American University faculty and distinguished international economists to discuss and undertake research on "Globalization in Crisis: An Action Agenda for Global Human Security and Sustainability."

Between 1994 and 1998, Mr. Bradford was Chief Economist of the United States Agency for International Development (USAID) where he served as a Presidential Appointee in the Clinton Administration. From 1990 to 1994, Mr. Bradford was Head of Research at the Development Centre of the Organization of Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD) in Paris. Prior to serving with the OECD, he was the senior staff member in charge of the international economic outlook work of the Strategic Planning Division of the World Bank.

He is author and editor of several publications including *The New Paradigm of Systemic Competitiveness: Toward More Integrated Policies in Latin America*, and numerous articles on the East Asia trade and development experience.

Dr. Colin Bradford received his B.A. degree in History from Yale University and his M.A. and Ph.D. degrees in Economics from Columbia University.



Mr. Ian Dunlop

Former CEO of the Australian Institute of Company Directors; Deputy Convenor of the Australian Association for the Study of Peak Oil; Member of the Club of Rome

Ian Dunlop has wide experience in energy resources, infrastructure, and international business, for many years on the staff of Royal Dutch Shell. He

has worked in oil, gas and coal exploration and production, in scenario and long-term energy planning, competition reform and privatization.

He chaired the Australian Coal Association in 1987-88, and the Australian Greenhouse Office Experts Group on Emissions Trading in 1998-2000. From 1997 to 2001 he was CEO of the Australian Institute of Company Directors.

Ian has a particular interest in the interaction of corporate governance, corporate responsibility and sustainability. An engineer from the University of Cambridge, he is a Fellow of the Australian Institute of Company Directors, the Australasian Institute of Mining and Metallurgy and the Energy Institute (UK), and a Member of the Society of Petroleum Engineers of AIME (USA). He chairs the Australian National Wildlife Collection Foundation (CSIRO), is Deputy Convenor of the Australian Association for the Study of Peak Oil and advises on governance and sustainability.



Dr. Angel Gurría

Secretary-General of the OECD

Born on May 8th, 1950, in Tampico, Mexico, Angel Gurría came to the OECD following a distinguished career in public service, including two ministerial posts.

As Mexico's Minister of Foreign Affairs from December 1994 to January 1998, he made dialogue and consensus-building one of the hallmarks of his approach to global issues. From January 1998 to December 2000, he was Mexico's Minister of Finance and Public Credit. For the first time in a

generation, he steered Mexico's economy through a change of Administration without a recurrence of the financial crises that had previously dogged such changes.

As OECD Secretary-General, since June 2006, he has reinforced the OECD's role as a 'hub' for global dialogue and debate on economic policy issues while pursuing internal modernization and reform. Under his leadership, OECD has agreed to open membership talks with Chile, Estonia, Israel, Russia and Slovenia and to strengthen links with other major emerging economies, including Brazil, China, India, Indonesia and South Africa, with a view to possible membership.

Mr. Gurría is an active participant in various international not-for-profit bodies, including the Population Council, based in New York, and the Center for Global Development based in Washington. He chaired the International Task Force on Financing Water for All and continues to be deeply involved in water issues. He is a member of the International Advisory Board of Governors of the Centre for International Governance Innovation, based in Canada, and was the first recipient of the Globalist of the Year Award of the Canadian International Council to honour his efforts as a global citizen to promote trans-nationalism, inclusiveness, and a global consciousness.

Mr. Gurría holds a B.A. degree in Economics from UNAM (Mexico), and a M.A. degree in Economics from Leeds University (United Kingdom). He speaks: Spanish, French, English, Portuguese, Italian and some German.

He is married to Dr. Lulu Quintana, a distinguished ophthalmologist, and they have three adult children.

Dr. Eberhard von Koerber is Co-President of the Club of Rome, co-founder and Vice President of the Wittenberg Centre for Global Ethics and Past Chairman and Member of the Board of the World Scout Foundation. Moreover, Eberhard von Koerber is a member of the Board of Trustees of the Berlin Philharmonic Orchestra. He is member of the Clinton Global Initiative, New York, and Ambassador of the New Social Market Economy Initiative (INSM) in Germany.

Eberhard von Koerber is a member of the Advisory Board of Hapag Lloyd AG, Hamburg as well as a member of the Board of Körber AG, Hamburg. From 1988 until 1998 Dr. von Koerber was Executive Vice President of the Group Executive Committee of ABB Ltd., Zurich. Before, he was serving as a member of the Group Management Board of BMW AG in Munich, Germany.



Mr. Martin Lees

Martin Lees is a graduate in Mechanical Sciences from Cambridge University with a post-graduate Diploma in European Studies from the College of Europe in Bruges, Belgium.

After some years as a manager in industry, he joined OECD where he was responsible for programmes on Cooperation in Science and Technology and on Innovation in the Procedures and Structures of Government and also for the design and launching of the "InterFutures Project" on the Future of the Advanced Industrial Societies in Harmony with that of the Developing Countries.

He then served at the United Nations in several capacities, including Executive Director of the Financing System for Science and Technology for Development and, in 1982, he was appointed Assistant Secretary General. During this period he assisted as Executive Director in the establishment of the InterAction Council of former Heads of State and Government. He has also been responsible for several high level programmes of International Cooperation with China, including an advisory programme for the leadership, "China and the World in the Nineties" from 1988 to 1998 and the establishment of the China Council for International Cooperation on Environment and Development of which he was a member for 15 years.

From 1991-1996 he developed and implemented programmes of cooperation with the Newly Independent States of the Former Soviet Union as Director General of the International Committee for Economic Reform and Cooperation. From January 2001 to April 2005 he was Rector of the University for Peace of the United Nations in Costa Rica, guiding its revitalization and launching eight Masters programmes on peace and security related issues.

He was elected to the post of Secretary General of the Club of Rome in September 2007 with effect from January 2008.



Prof. Mohan Munasinghe

Born in Sri Lanka, Prof. Mohan Munasinghe shared the 2007 Nobel Peace Prize, as Vice Chairman of the United Nations Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC-AR4), for work on global warming and sustainable development. Currently, he is also Chairman of the Munasinghe Inst. of Development (MIND), Colombo; Director-General of the Sustainable Consumption Institute (SCI) and Distinguished Professor at the University of Manchester, UK; and Honorary Senior Advisor to the Sri Lanka Govt.

He has earned post-graduate degrees in engineering, physics and development economics from Cambridge University (UK), Massachusetts Institute of Technology (USA), and McGill University and Concordia University (Canada). Prof. Munasinghe has also received several honorary doctorates (*honoris causa*). During 35 years of distinguished public service, he has served as Senior Energy Advisor to the President of Sri Lanka, Advisor to the United States Presidents Council on Environmental Quality, and Senior Advisor/Manager, World Bank.



Prof. Roberto Peccei

Roberto D. Peccei is Vice Chancellor for Research at UCLA. He is a particle theorist whose interests lie at the interface between particle physics and cosmology.

Peccei was born in Italy, completed his secondary school in Argentina, and pursued his university studies in physics in the United States. He was a faculty member at Stanford (1971-78), a staff member at the Max Planck Institute in Munich (1978-84) and at the DESY Laboratory in Hamburg (1984-88), before joining the faculty at UCLA. Before assuming his present position in 2000, he was Chair of Physics (1989-93) and Dean of Physical Sciences (1994-2000).

Peccei was the Schroedinger Professor at the University of Vienna (1983), the Boris Jacobsohn Lecturer at the University of Washington (1986), the Emilio Segre Professor at the University of Tel Aviv (1992), and the first Abdus Salam Memorial Lecturer in Pakistan (1997). He is a Fellow of the American Physical Society, the U. K. Institute of Physics, the American Association for the Advancement of Science, and the World Academy of Arts and Sciences. He is a member of the Executive Committee of the Club of Rome and in 2002 he was named a Commendatore in Italy.

Mr Wijkman has been a Member of the European Parliament since 1999. Mr Wijkman was the European Parliament Rapporteur for a Post 2012 Climate Change Agreement.

He is a member of the Christian Democrats, part of the European People's Party - European Democrats group and sits on the European Parliament's Committee on the Environment, Public Health and Food Safety.
